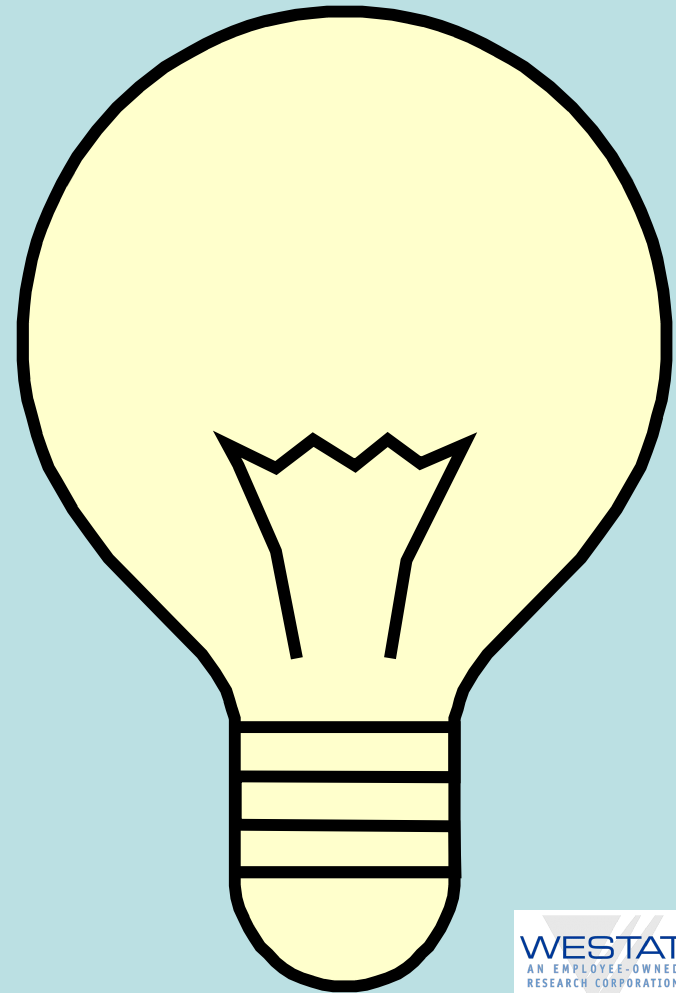

- Innovation defined within *specific context or setting*

- Innovations in health care delivery occur in silos:

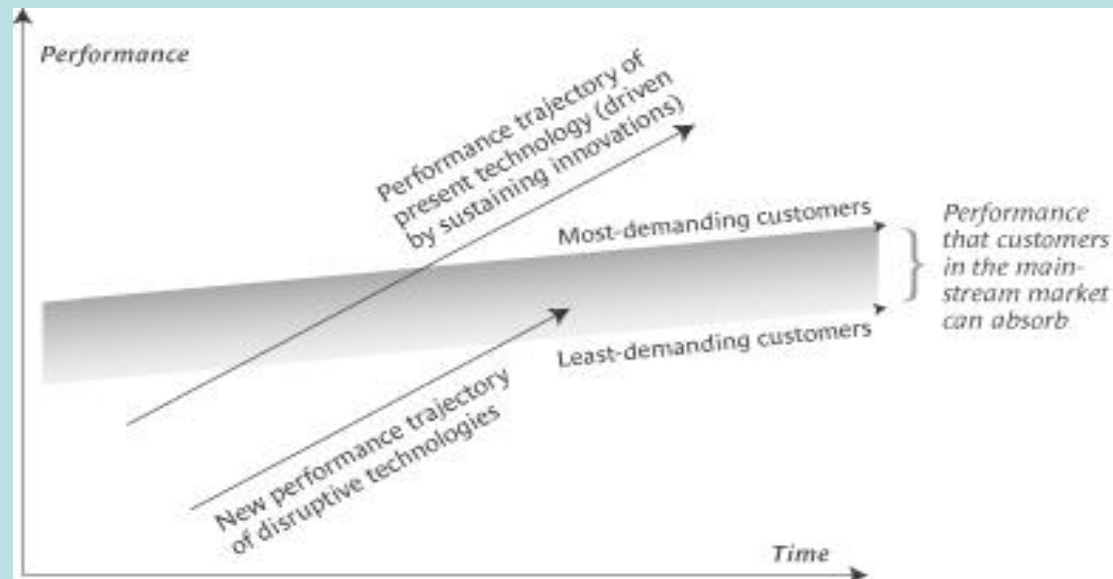
- A specific setting
